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






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

Rochelle Gilmore had barely stepped out of the saddle in Delhi before she tweeted that, such was her jubilation at finally landing a serious victory. The Aussie cyclist – now based in Italy – has been the best in the world for some time now, but the big prizes eluded her. She put that right in the 112km race last week, beating England's Lizzie Armitstead into silver. Olympic champion Nicole Cooke Irepresenting Wates] came in fifth.

Indeed, as she swept past Armitstead and fellow Australian Chloe Hosking as they neared the line, it looked a breeze — and so it was. "Apart from the wild monkeys and stray dogs, there was nothing too challenging,"

she said afterwards. "We were told there would be no wild animals... but there were."

Gilmore started riding BMX bikes at three and also showed an aptitude for gymnastics, athletics, swimming and surf lifesaving, but she gave up everything in order to focus on BMX and surf lifesaving. Then, deciding that she wanted to represent Australia and with neither sport then an Olympic discipline, she switched to more conventional cycling – and was Australian under-15 national champion within three months.

She left school at 15 to compete as an elite cyclist and continued her education through correspondence courses, such was her determination to succeed. Last week, it all paid off. You little ripper! in
